In the European tradition of excellence.

The very reason for Sun Line's being is the very best reason you should travel with us.

It all goes back to the 1950s, when travel to and through the Aegean once again caught the imagination of sophisticated Europe. But while the idea of Crete and Rhodes and Patmos exhilarated the mind, the actual voyage to those faraway places could turn out to be less than exhilarating. For the mode of travel offered was a choice of a mailboat to the Cyclades and beyond or some small reconverted tanker chugging into the night.

It was at this time that an enterprising young Greek shipping executive, already a well-known personality, launched his first Sun Line ship into the Aegean, the *Stella Maris I*. His name was Ch. Alex Keusseoglou and his concept of cruising was this: blend the intimate quality of smaller ships with the high standards of the best of the larger liners.

Surroundings and accommodations would be spa-



cious and elegant, yet intimate; service, attentive, impeccable and personal; dining, a time to get together with friends and acquaintances for a pleasurable experience. In addition, Sun Line also quickly developed a reputation for having an unerring sense for choosing fascinating ports of call.

The overall effect was a perfect blending of the European tradition of excellence with the American tradition of comfort. The Sun Line concept of cruising was an immediate success, and Mr. Keusseoglou added other cruise-liners to his fleet to meet the demand. Sun Line became, and still is today, the premier cruiseline of the Aegean.

Today, the ships have changed and all are newer, but the Sun Line tradition of excellence continues. Sun Line still sets the same standards and styles created in the Aegean. Our fleet has been found for many years in the Caribbean and along the coast of South America as well as in more distant waters—the entire Mediterranean, the

coast of Africa, the fjords of Norway. And this winter, once again in the indigo blue waters of the Caribbean.

Starting in December, we offer you a choice of 15 sailings in the Caribbean where you can experience the Sun Line standards of hospitality. Our new flagship, the Stella Solaris (18,000 tons) will sail a series of cruises out of Galveston and Tampa; our yacht-like Stella Oceanis (6,000 tons) will sail a series of cruises out of San Juan.

The Stella Solaris is sleek in styling, spacious in size, with room for 630 guests and 310 crew. The Stella Oceanis has room for 280 guests and 140 crew; its accommodation is very comfortable, its size permits the Captain to chart a yacht itinerary.

Each ship offers you a different style of cruising. One feature, however, remains constant—the Sun Line concept of travel: that combination of the European tradition of excellence with the American tradition of comfort.



In the European tradition of service.

On a Sun Line cruise, you'll find that service is more than a word—it is something that is around you all the time. For we have a ratio very close to one crew member to every two passengers, enabling us to look after you completely 24 hours a day.

Service comes in one nationality on a Sun Line Cruise, and fortunately, that nationality is Greek. It is known throughout Europe that Greeks have a fantastic sense of hospitality; they are sincere, warm, generous and unassuming, without ulterior motive. And to a Greek, being in service is a position still looked upon with pride and respect.

You'll experience this hospitality throughout your entire cruise. As you come on board, you'll be greeted by the Chief Steward and his entourage. You'll be shown to your spacious cabin by your personal Room Steward, where he'll assist you in getting settled.



Throughout the voyage, he will attend to your every request. He'll make sure you won't miss the early-morning arrivals at new ports of call. If you like, he'll see to it that a continental breakfast is served to you in bed. He'll make sure there are always enough fluffy towels in your bath, that your room is always tidied, that your bed is made once you're up and out and turned down for a good night's sleep. He'll take care of your clothes that need pressing; he'll even shine your shoes if you leave them by your cabin door when you retire.

When it's time for dining, you'll move to the Dining Salon and be treated with the same courtesy by a completely different staff. The Chief Dining Steward will take you to the table you request. Your waiters are there; the wine steward is standing by. The table itself has fresh flowers, monogrammed china and fine crystal. And all around you are other people having a good time.



Tonight, we might start dinner with *petite marmite à la Française*, followed by *shrimps tourkolimano*; the main course might be *tournedos sauté Rossini*; for dessert, *profiterole au chocolat Chantilly* and *Byzantine coffee*.

Or you might have *creme velouté Monte Carlo*, followed by *moqueca of fresh sea bass à la Veracruzana*; the main course might be *suprême de poularde Renaissance*; and for dessert, *nougatine gâteau au Chantilly*. Again, of course, with *Byzantine coffee*.

An additional touch to every menu are little surprises from Greece like stuffed grape leaves and *pastitsio* and *moussaka*. There always is fresh fruit—cherries, strawberries, melon.

Whether you're dining by candlelight or sunning yourself by the pool—whatever—you will be treated with the same courtesy. You would think that you cannot ask for more than that. But if you do, it will be done.



In the European tradition of style.

Style is something indefinable. But it is something you can readily observe in every aspect of a Sun Line Cruise.

It's the way the Captain greets you when you're introduced at his Cocktail Party.

It's the élan of the crew when they teach you to dance the syrtaki at Greek Night. (That's the night the Salon is turned into a taverna, with candlelight and bazouki music. You'll see the folk dances from the islands of Greece, you'll dine on souvlaki and retsina wine.)

Style is the selection of entertainment every night, whether it's a top international song stylist, a dance troupe from Jamaica, or a steel band from Trinidad/Tobago. Each has been chosen for its particular perfection in its particular field.

Style is having your own cocktail party in your cabin, with stewards weaving through the guests offering drinks and hors d'oeuvres. And part of that style is having



cabins and suites big enough to have a party in.

Style is having a continental breakfast in bed, bouillon and biscuits at 10 am, a buffet luncheon by the swimming pool, afternoon tea in the library.

Style is using your imagination and winning one of the top prizes at the Masquerade Ball. Style is hitting the jackpot in the Monte Carlo Room.

Style is the music we play, whether it's live by a full orchestra or a small combo, whether it's at a piano bar or from a selection of top 40 records in the late-night discotheque. (Ask the discogirl to teach you the "robot.")

Style is what you'll find in the colorful resortwear from Italy and Greece at the boutique. Style is also the bold designs in Greek gold, the subtle scents in perfumes from Paris, the silk and chiffon.

Style is jogging on the decks each morning long before that early-bird coffee by the pool, long before we

reach the mystery of an island you only heard of yesterday.

Style is a room with individually controlled air conditioning and music transmission and a telephone to get you anything you can possibly think of.

Style is planning your evening so you can see the merengue dancers from Santo Domingo in the Main Salon, catch the new Robert Redford movie, get to the Midnight Buffet, and still have time for a nightcap in a hideaway corner.

Style is hitting the clay pigeon the first time you try trap-shooting—and then, to prove it wasn't just a lucky shot, hitting the next one.

Stella Solaris: flagship of our fleet.

In this age of rhetoric versus reality, it is difficult to talk of the Stella Solaris without sounding like just one more list of superlatives. The Stella Solaris truly is the epitome of everything a great cruiseliner must be.

Everywhere you look there is a lavish use of space, open and sweeping, counterpointed with a fine attention to detail. For example, as you walk into the Main Lounge, you will find one entire wall understated in dark wine velvet. Another wall is an elongated mural of hand-wrought bronze; another, an entire wall of windows looking out onto the blue of the Caribbean.

On the staircases leading from deck to deck, you'll find a series of bronze murals, subtly lighted, each depicting one of the Greek classic dramas. The theatre is the size of an art theatre in any metropolis; its seats and walls of deep velours progress through an analogy of colors. The Grill Room is all leather upholstery and



burnished browns, rosewood and hand-cast bronze. It's the perfect place to relax over an aperitif.

You'll find this use of space outdoors, too. The two swimming pools are oversized for a ship; there is 24,000 square feet of deck space on which you can look for a corner to read or sun.

Most important, you'll find this use of space in your cabin or suite. The Stella Solaris has more out-sized rooms for her capacity than any other ship. 110 state-rooms have their own sitting rooms; the floors are carpeted wall-to-wall in deep pile.

You'll also find on board a sauna and gymnasium, a Monte Carlo Room, a boutique and beauty parlor.

Look at it this way. You can sail almost every ship that sails the Caribbean any day of the week.

But you can only sail the Stella Solaris in the Caribbean once a year. Bon voyage.

San Andres. Just off Nicaragua, an emerald hideaway of snow white beaches and coral reefs. Beautiful.

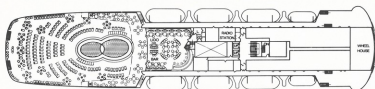
San Blas. On the north cape of Panama. Home of the Cunas, talented in the art of "Mola" embroidery.

Fly/Cruise Package rates are not airfares, but, when added to per-person cruise fares indicated, represent substantial savings in the cost of traveling to and from point of embarkation. Package rates are based upon regular round-trip economy, Discover America and other excursion fares in effect July 17, 1975. Therefore, all package rates are subject to increase or decrease at any time, whether through C.A.B. approved adjustments of tariffs or removal or increase of air fuel surcharges in force. In the event of change, decreases or increases in package rates will be passed on to the passenger. Port taxes are not included in above package rates.

General Information.

Reservations and Deposit: Reservations are accepted upon receipt of a deposit in the amount of 20% of the total cruise fare. No reservation is considered "firm" until such deposit is received. The balance is due not later than 45 days prior to departure.

Cruise Fares: Include cruise accommodations from point of embarkation to point of debarkation, all meals and entertainment while on board. The ship is your hotel throughout the cruise. **Not included** are personal expenditures such as gratuities, laundry, beverages (not part of the regular menu), expenditures incurred ashore and shore excursions, and other personal items.

Cancellations and Refunds: Wholly Unused Transportation: 20% of cruise fare may be assessed if accommodations are cancelled within 45 days of sailing. In the event accommodations are resold, full fare will be refunded. Non-appearance at time of sailing without prior notification is subject to 100% cancellation fee.

Children's Fares: Children under the age of 16 occupying the same room (3 or 4 berth cabin) as two full fare paying adults, will be charged 50% of the applicable adult cruise rate.

Third Person Fare: The fare for a third or fourth adult occupying an upper berth in a standard double room will be the minimum per-person rate for that given cruise.

Single Fare: The fare for exclusive occupancy (single) of a double room, when available, is one and one half times the adult per-person rate for that particular stateroom. Suites and deluxe rooms will be charged twice the per-person rate.

Port Taxes: Those taxes that may be assessed by Port Authorities in certain foreign ports are for the account of the passenger and are payable at time of ticket issuance.

Optional Shore Excursions: Well-planned shore excursions for most ports are available. Information about these excursions will be available in a separate folder issued several weeks before departure. Passengers may purchase shore excursions in advance through their travel agent or Sun Line, or aboard ship, subject to availability.

Baggage Liability: Sun Line's responsibility with respect to lost, damaged or mis-delivered baggage and personal effects is strictly limited as detailed in the Passage Contract. It is therefore recommended that passengers consider their individual insurance requirements, and obtain additional baggage insurance for the full duration of their trip.

Physical Disability: Any physical disability that may require special attention or treatment must be reported when reservation is requested. Passage may be refused anyone whose state of health or physical condition renders them, in the opinion of the Line, unfit for travel, or anyone whose condition may constitute a danger to themselves or another passenger.

Travel Documents and Health Requirements: Passengers are encouraged to carry in their possession proof of citizenship (passport or birth certificate) when traveling outside the United States. Valid passports and health requirements differ according to cruise destinations. Passengers may contact their travel agent or Sun Line Cruises for specific requirements.

Pets: Sorry, we are unable to accommodate pets.

Special Diets: If special diets are required, the Company should be furnished diet requirements at least two weeks prior to sailing.

Dining Room Reservations: Advance requests for main or late seating in the Dining Room will be honored subject to availability. Specific assignments will be arranged by the maître d'hôtel on sailing day.

Personal Funds/Credit Cards: Passengers are advised to carry travelers cheques for convenience and safety. They may be cashed aboard ship and are generally accepted ashore. Personal cheques will not be accepted for payment of shipboard expenses. American Express cards are accepted.

Valuables: For the convenience of the passengers, the ship's Purser accepts for deposit in the ship's safe, against receipt, valuables such as jewelry, money or documents. The liability of the

Company with regard to such deposit is limited to the conditions as stated in the Passage Contract.

Telephone Service/Radiograms: Ship-to-shore telephone service is available and radiograms can be sent while at sea.

Laundry and Valet Service: Pressing and laundry service are available aboard ship at a moderate charge.

Electric Current: Each stateroom on the Stella Solaris is equipped with 110 volt A.C., allowing operation of electric shavers without converters. The Stella Oceanis is equipped with 220 volt A.C., and converters are required on U.S. appliances. Passengers are advised to check with the Purser's Office or the room steward before attempting to use any electrical appliance.

Medical Services: A qualified physician and nurse are in attendance on all cruises.

Additional Services: Modern, complete beauty and barber shops are on board, as well as duty-free boutiques. Sauna and gymnasium are also available on the Stella Solaris.

Gratuities: Being a highly personal matter, each passenger must decide how to express his appreciation to the cruise staff for their services. Tipping may be done at the end of the cruise, by placing the amount in an envelope and dropping it in a special box at the Purser's desk upon final debarkation. As regulated by the Greek Seamen's Union, all tips are pooled and distributed throughout the staff. A suggested guideline for tips is minimum \$4 per day per passenger, or approximately 7% of the cruise fare.

Fly/Cruise and Pre-Cruise/Parking Packages: Marriott World Travel (MWT) serves as a coordinator for the passenger in all matters pertaining to hotels, airlines, motorcoach and ship cruise. The airlines and their agents and affiliates are not to be held responsible for any act, omission or event occurring during the time passengers are not on board the aircraft. MWT is not responsible for any damages occasioned from any cause whatsoever other than the responsibilities arising out of being the operator of MWT. MWT will not be responsible for any damages or inconvenience caused by late air, car or motorcoach arrivals or by any change of schedule or other conditions, nor for loss or damage to baggage or any article belonging to the passenger. The passenger ticket in use by the airlines (together with the pertinent tariff when issued) shall constitute the sole contract between the airlines and the purchaser of these tickets and/or the passenger. The services of any ATC or IATA airline may be used to connect with the various airlines at the established departure city. The price and availability of these tours are subject to change at any time. Sun Line, MWT and Holiday Inns will not be responsible in any way for automobiles left on their premises or in any parking facility at any time.

Responsibility: The transportation of passengers and baggage on Sun Line ships is provided solely by Oceanic Sun Line Special Shipping Co., Inc. (owners of the Stella Oceanis and Stella Maria) and Sun Line Greece Special Shipping Co., Inc. (owners of the Stella Solaris) and is governed by the terms and conditions printed on the Passenger Ticket Contract which may be inspected at any Sun Line office. Passenger's acceptance of that ticket constitutes agreement of those terms and conditions. Among other rights reserved, Sun Line, its owners, agents or representatives may choose not to accept or retain any person as a member of a cruise for any reason. Any cruise may be cancelled or altered if circumstances so demand. Fares and schedules are subject to change without notice. The right is reserved to assess additional fares and charges in effect at time of sailing. All arrangements for ship transportation are made by Sun Line Cruises—Western Hemisphere as agents. Responsibility of the carrier does not extend beyond the vessel; when passengers leave the vessel, any arrangements made for or by them are at their own risk. Payment of the deposit or any partial or full payment for a reservation constitutes consent to all provisions in this Conditions List.
