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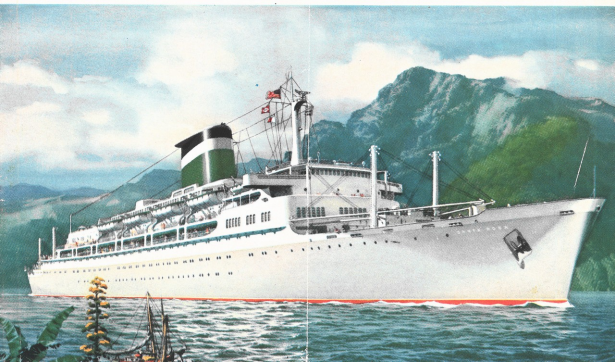

The itinerary presents some of the most popular ports in the Caribbean—cities that differ widely in character, with features that reflect Dutch, British or Spanish colonial heritage. Shore excursions offer an exciting variety of things to do and to see. "Santas" are docked in all ports except Nassau (where tenders are used) giving passengers freedom of movement between ship and shore.

CUBACAO, N.W.I. You'll be enchanted with Willemstad, capital of the Isle of Curacao—a quaint bit of Holland with little gabled buildings dressed up in the paint of colors. Here you'll enjoy the novel experience of sailing through the heart of the town in your cruise ship along a "water street" leading to the inner harbor. You'll watch the maneuvering of the famed postman bridge, "Queen

Emma" . . . see the Governor's Palace . . . the Curacao Intercontinental with its popular casino, a new hotel built within old Fort Amsterdam . . . and the colorful wheeler market where fruit and vegetables are sold

from picturesque sailing vessels. You'll have fun bargain-hunting in shops where merchandise from all parts of the world is sold practically at free-port prices.

CUBACAO (La Guaira), Venezuela. As the ship approaches Venezuela, you'll see one of the most spectacular harbors on the continent—mountains two miles high rising from the ocean's edge with the multicolored houses of La Guaira scattered down their slopes. From the port you motor over a superhighway leading through magnificent mountains to Caracas, one of the wealthiest and fastest-growing capital cities in South America. Highlights of

the sightseeing tour include: University City; the new \$150-million Centro Bolivar; the sumptuous Officers' Club; the Cathedral; the Pantheon and other historic shrines associated with the life and works of the Great Liberator, Simon Bolivar, famed native son. If you like thrills you'll want to take the cablecar trip to the top of Mt. Arillas and will delight in shops featuring the exquisitely wrought gold orchid jewelry for which Venezuela is noted. Buy bags and hammocks, pearls and articles of mother-of-pearl, and attractive native sandals known as *alpargatas*.

ARUBA, N.W.I. You'll find this island completely different from her sister, Curacao, and because of her small size and fine roads the chief points of interest are within easy reach—the giant *conchiglie* at Ayo, a Ghost Town at Palisado, and the Pirate Castle. You'll be delighted with Palm Beach which with its sugar-soft sands and turquoise waters is one of the world's loveliest. Added attractions here are the new \$4.5-million Aruba Caribbean Hotel with attractive nightclub and casino, and the Rust Rail Hotel-Club. Here, as in Curacao, you'll be intrigued with the shops which offer at freepoint prices, Dutch tiles and

tion to stores displaying handsome English merchandise, there is the Victoria Arts and Crafts Market where you'll find all types of articles featuring native stone work and handicraft, paintings, and tapestries.

BALENAE, N.P. This picturesque capital of the British Bahamas is known the world over for its fine pink sands and ultra-smart luxury hotels. By motor or fringed-topped survey you visit storied forts where ancient warriors recall the romantic era of buccannery . . . Blackbeard's Tower . . . Queen's Staircase . . . historic old churches . . . quaint byways fragrant with the scent of exotic tropical flowers. If you want to improve the notion that is proof of travel in sunny climes—there's Paradise Beach, a favorite with the international set. Its smart shops and

other articles, Swiss watches, Panama hats, silk, and carved ivory from the Orient, Irish linen, British woollens, perfumes, and fine tapestries; and other tempting bargains.

JAMAICA, N.W.I. On Jamaica, an island of exotic tropical gardens, palm-fringed beaches and blue mountains, you'll visit Kingston, the capital. Among the many points of interest are the Institute of Jamaica and its exhibits of the island's colonial past; Castles Botanical Gardens with an amazing variety of tropical trees and plants; Hope Gardens with a fabulous Orchid House; and on the north coast, Bob's Blos and Fern Gully. You'll have time for swimming and sunning at one of the several fine beaches, and you'll particularly enjoy shopping. In addi-

stores you'll be intrigued with the excellent "bays" in china, woollens and other English merchandise. And in the you've-never-seen-this-before category there's the parade of pink flamingoes staged in Adiastra Gardens.

PORT EVERGLADES (Port Lauderdale—Miami). From this port, the "Venice of America", you can motor along Florida's fabulous Gold Coast with its famous beaches, glittering hotels and colorful yacht basins. Or, take a cruiser trip through some of the incomparable canals that form part of the Intracoastal Waterway, for a look at the stately mansions, gorgeous gardens and "pocket" parks of the millionaires who winter here. The famous marina in Port Lauderdale, Bahia Mar, is said to be the largest



and most modern in the world; it is municipally owned and in winter the value of luxurious yachts, sloops, yamls, cruises and fishing craft assembled here often tops \$250,000,000. You may want to terminate your cruise at Port Everglades and spend some time with rod and reel—big game fishing here in the Atlantic is excellent; and sail-fish, king, dolphin, bonito and other large species abound.

NOTE: Travelers living in the South can embark at Port Everglades and make the cruise via New York—sailing north, spending two days and a night in New York, and continuing on the same ship north over the regular Caribbean route and disembarking in Florida.

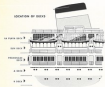

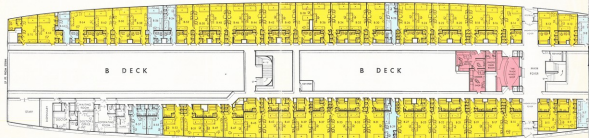

Hints On What To Pack

Packing for a cruise is not as much of a problem as in the case with many other types of trip. With the ship serving as your hotel, you unpack when you leave New York and forget luggage problems until you return. Your stateroom with its private bathroom provides ample drawer and wardrobe space in which to stow away your clothing, accessories and toiletries as neatly and conveniently as you do at home.

The question of what to pack is not a complicated one either—in general, a summer-weight wardrobe plus a warmer outfit or two if you leave New York in cold weather. On shipboard for daytime wear: sports clothes suitable for play, casuals for strolling or loafing; and if you go in for swimming and sun-bathing, a couple of swim suits, a beach robe to protect you from the sun and its reflection on water; and rubber bath slippers or clogs, to wear from stateroom to pool.

For evenings at sea: cocktail and/or dinner gowns, or more informal wear, if you prefer. There's no must about "dressing for dinner." The new "fantasies," however, have a gay and glamorous air about them in the evening that seems to put passengers in the mood for dressing. You'll probably feel more festive if you don dinner clothes a time or two, especially for the Captain's get-together party at the beginning and the gala dinner at the end of the trip. It is well to bear in mind, however, that passengers do not "dress" on the first night out, on Sunday, at the end of a day in port, or the night before arrival in New York. Women find most practical, pretty or monotonous that will not wrinkle readily; men when "dressing" don summer-weight dinner jackets, usually light in color.

Ashore you'll wear summer-weight street clothes such as would be appropriate in your home town.
